
After that we learnt about what Christians believe and celebrate at Christmas.





We sequenced pictures to help us to retell the story and performed it in our Year 1 Nativity which we hope you all enjoyed.








Year 2 Nightingale



Year 3 Pankhurst



This term has been focused on ice and snow with our two focus stories having wintery settings.

The children were excited to see a short snow shower outside and handle the ice left behind even though it didn't last for long.


We have been looking at information texts in guided reading and learning about their features. During our history and geography lessons, we have explored the climate in the Arctic and found out what a settlement is and discovered the differences between a city, town or village. As one of our focus texts was originally written by Charles Dickens, we also investigated life in Victorian times, finding out about life for the poor, comparing schools then and now as well as looking at how Christmas was celebrated. Our trip to Kent Life brought this to life and the children had a great time visiting the many workshops and making candles.

In English, we have been focusing on forming sentences carefully and punctuating them accurately. The children have learned how to use prepositions to describe where things are and speech marks to show when somebody is speaking. Spelling has also been a focus this term and the children have been able to recognise some homophones to help them to choose which spelling to use. They have enjoyed using similes to make descriptions interesting as well as discovering new vocabulary.



In Maths they have been learning to recognise right angles in shapes and identify when an angle is smaller or larger than this. They have learned how to measure accurately with a ruler and find the perimeter of a 2d shape. Learning times tables is a really important skill and the children have been enjoying doing this through Times Tables Rockstars. They have also developed more understanding of what multiplication and division mean through different activities in our lessons.

Our Science topic offered more opportunity to compare life now with that in Victorian times through considering what a healthy diet looks like and how different parts of our body work together. The children were fascinated to see how bones and muscles work to keep us upright and help us to move.

Our Roman topic helped us to learn different skills in our English lessons, including writing a nonchronological report on our findings of Roman life. We have been working hard to include fronted adverbials, direct and indirect speech within our writing.

Science has been very interesting, learning about electricity, its uses and of course how we keep,safe. We made circuits from different components to make the current flow to light a bulb.

Our PE lessons have been very active, as we have been learning how to play tag rugby, safely as a team. We have also been moving to different styles of music in different ways, to show our understanding of creating drama through movements when we reenacted the famous story, 'Escape to Pompeii'.

Year 4 Fitzgerald



Fitzgerald class has had an amazing term 2! We have been learning all about the Romans and had a wonderful day experiencing what it was like to be a Roman soldier. We learnt how they marched and what sort of orders they had to follow. On our Roman day we also dressed up, made shields and had a Roman Banquet, enjoying some of the food that they would have eaten then. We have extended our Roman topic into English, writing a non chronological report on our findings of Roman life and Roman inventions. We worked hard to use our skills including fronted adverbials, expanded noun phrases and also using indirect speech in another piece of written work.







In RE we have been learning all about the Christmas story as part of Christianity. We made our own Christmas decorations and had fun making Christingles.

Science has been a real learning journey. We have learnt all about Electricity, and can now make simple circuits, using different components to make a bulb light or a buzzer buzz! We learnt about how we can make the light bulb brighter by using more power and how switches are an important component of a circuit as they help us to control electricity usage.

We have busily prepared for our Christmas fair during enterprise week, completing activities including baking Christmas cookies, making Christmas decorations and of course making our wonderful Christmas hoops. We have also this term completed cross stitching activities to recreate a Roman cross.

In maths we have been persistent and tenacious with our learning. We practiced using our multiplication skills to find areas of shapes, and worked hard to find the similarities in the 3, 6 and 9 times tables. Of course every weekend we have also been practicing on times tables rock stars and have made great progress getting faster at answering multiplication sums.

PE and Music have been very active, learning how to play tag rugby and also looking at movement in dance so we could act out through dance the story of Escape from Pompeii.

Year 5




This term Year 5 have been learning about the Ancient Greek civilisation and how it all began.
